£50,000 Target for Cancer Treatment in Suffolk

"With further support from the Freemasons' of Suffolk it is my hope to donate, early next year, a total of £50000 for the detection and treatment of prostate cancer in the male population of Suffolk". This is the message from the Provincial Grand Master, RWBro. Robert J. R. Tile.

We are almost half way there following the fund raising efforts of the Provincial Grand Stewards Lodge, and supported by the Lodges, brethren, families and friends from across the county as part of the Week of Awareness last year. Almost £24000 was raised from the show held at the Spa Pavilion and, with plans well advanced, a similar event is to be held on 21st February 2004 at the same venue. Organiser, WBro. John Yeldham and his team are confident that we can do even better than last year.

Following last year's success, consideration was given to the establishment of a Trust Fund, using the earnings from it to support brethren who needed treatment for prostate cancer and associated illnesses. However, this has not been possible to organise so an alternative way of using the surpluses from the events has been approved by the Provincial Grand Master, RWBro. Robert J. R. Tile.

He has asked Past Assistant Provincial Grand Master, WBro. John Yeldham, to research the needs of Hospitals in West Suffolk, Ipswich and the James Paget at Gorleston. Based on the outcome of this study, the Provincial Grand Master will then ensure that the money is allocated, in the best possible way, for the purchase of much needed equipment. The Provincial Grand Master and his team extend their grateful thanks to WBro. John Yeldham and the Stewards Lodge, together with all the Brethren of Suffolk for their help in supporting this appeal.

With the completion of this fund raising activity, future Provincial efforts will mainly be directed towards our 2009 Festival Appeal for the New Masonic Samaritan Fund.

RMTGB is a Major Sponsor for 2003 National Junior Games for Children with Disabilities

The Royal Masonic Trust for Girls and Boys (RMTGB) will be a major sponsor of the 2003 National Junior Games for children with disabilities to be held at Stoke Mandeville from 24-28 September 2003.

The National Junior Games is an annual event organised and hosted by the British Wheelchair Sports Foundation in conjunction with other National Disability Sports Organisations for children with disabilities aged between 11 and 18 years. This unique event is part of a co-ordinated approach to the development of sporting opportunities for young people with disabilities, and is held in conjunction with Cerebral Palsy Sport, Disability Sport England, British Amputees and Les Autres Sports Association.

This is the second time the RMTGB has sponsored the National Junior Games. This

Masonic Children's Trust now Royal

With effect from 1st May 2003, Her Majesty The Queen is content for the MTGB (Masonic Trust for Girls and Boys) to be named 'Royal Masonic Trust for Girls and Boys'.

The official announcement was made by His Royal Highness the Duke of Kent, Grand Master of The United Grand Lodge of England, and Grand President of the Trust, at a regular meeting of Grand Lodge in London.

President of the new Royal Masonic Trust for Girls and Boys, Andrew Stebbings, said, 'This news is welcomed by the Council of the Trust and is a great honour for all of the members of the Craft throughout England and Wales.'

The Royal Masonic Trust for Girls and Boys is

year's £10,000 grant will help to fund the costs of accommodation, catering, programmes, medals and certificates, for around 180 children from across the UK who will attend the games, accompanied by around 80 escorts and 70 officials.

The children will have a physical and mild sensory disability. They receive instruction from qualified coaches and experienced athletes with a disability in a wide range of sports including archery, athletics, basketball, boccia, bowls, kurling, fencing, polybat, powerlifting, shooting, swimming, table cricket, table tennis, tennis and zone hockey. "We are delighted that the Council of the Royal Masonic Trust for Girls and Boys has again agreed to support us and be a major sponsor for the National Junior Games', said British Wheelchair Sports Foundation Trust Officer, Melinda Arthur. "The games provide the inspiration for many of the children to achieve far more than they had previously thought possible, and enables them to further develop mentally and physically."

one of the central Masonic charities. The primary aim of the Trust is to assist with the education and welfare of the children of deceased or distressed Freemasons. When funds permit, however, the Trust may also assist non-Masonic children by giving grants to other children's charities.

During last year, over 3,000 individual young people benefited from assistance. Sixty non-Masonic organisations also benefited form donations. In addition, throughout England and Wales, 25 children's hospices enjoy the benefits of the Trust's £7.5 million *lifelite* information technology scheme. *lifelites* is a special fund - established in 1998 as the Trust's millennium project - that provides networked multi-media communications and computer-aided educational and recreational facilities to the children in the hospices.

TEDDIES CHEER-UP THE CHILDREN

In the Province of Suffolk we have launched a trial of the Teddies for Loving Care project at the Ipswich Heath Road Hospital. This trial is proving to be such a success that we can confirm our ongoing support. The PGM has given his approval to this initiative and investigations are in place to examine whether we can extend the concept to other hospitals in the Province.

Past Assistant PGM Angus Graham has been responsible for leading the initiative, obtaining the Teddies and all the administrative procedures.

What happens is that we supply the Hospital with a stock of little cuddly teddy bears, which have a small label stating that it has been supplied by Suffolk Freemasons. The nurses in charge at the Accident and Emergency Department then decide when to give a child a teddy. The scheme is being co-ordinated by Suzanne Gregory who is the Play Specialist.

Suzanne tells us that it is a wonderful idea and the Teddies make the experience of Accident and Emergency much more positive for children at a time of extreme stress and worry. A visit to the A &E department is often a first experience of medical care, and because of the urgency, at that time, the necessary cuddly item is often left at home.

Not all children are given a teddy but the nurses use their experience to judge when such a gift can be very useful. Suzanne gives the example of a little boy who came in to have his stitches removed, and he was very apprehensive. However a quick stitch in Teddy and a demonstration of how easily it was removed, calmed the little boy, and the task was then carried out with no fuss at all.

The Teddy is a permanent gift to the child and goes with them on their Hospital journey. One of the stories told at the outset is that the little Teddy needs a home and someone to love them.

Children's Nurse Elaine Haigh tells us that it is a lovely idea and much appreciated, not only by the children but also by the staff. We sometimes give one to a sibling which can help to calm nerves at a time of family stress, she told us.

Elaine tells us that they are now kept on the ambulances for use when away from Heath Road. It can be a useful small gift if the crew attend a house where perhaps there has been a bereavement, and a child needs a little special comfort.

On occasions there has been a young at heart teenager, who has been very distressed, and a cuddly teddy has worked wonders.

Suzanne Gregory thanks you all for your help and tells us that it is lovely to have the support of Suffolk Freemasons with this extremely worthwhile project.

THE 87 YEAR OLD FALL GUY!

The only way was down - at top speed - for 87 years old Jim Baxter when he took part in a 10,000ft skydive.

Jim, of Carlton Colville, wanted to help the East Anglian Air Ambulance and to do so he took to the skies in truly daredevil fashion.

His stunt raised more than £600.

"I've always wanted to do a parachute jump," said Jim. "I had to get my doctor to sign a piece of paper to allow me to do it, and when I asked him what he thought he said" 'If you are healthy, do it.' So I did!"

He added: "I believe the East Anglian Air Ambulance does such a very good job. All of us living in the region could be grateful for the air ambulance one day if we find ourselves in trouble, and I was determined to support them as best I could."

He made a tandem jump with his instructor, Andy Page, which meant they were strapped together under a single chute.

Mr. Page was on top to control the free fall and the speed, leaving Mr. Baxter free to enjoy the ride.

"My nephew had suggested that I shout 'Geronimo!' as I left the plane, but the fall only took 35 seconds and in the excitement I just forgot," he said.

The first 5000 feet of the jump was in freefall at a speed of 120mph, then they used a small chute to slow them down as the approached the ground.

"When Andy released the main chute we slowed down considerably and he shouted to me to enjoy the view, which was just fabulous from up there," said Jim, a retired post office engineer.

The jump took place at Old Buckenham Airfield in Norfolk, and Andy reckons Jim is his oldest pupil to date.

"We had a woman who was 80 and another man in his early 80s, but Mr. Baxter is our eldest so far," he said.

The event was recorded on video by fellow skydiver Adrian Baldry, who followed them with his camcorder, and Jim has been able to replay the jump at home in Elmdale Drive to his 96 year old wife, Florence.

"She hasn't been able to see very much but she says she is very proud of me," he said.

ROYAL ARK MARINERS CENTENARY

Royal Ark Mariners Centenary

In November 2003 The Edmondsbury Lodge of Royal Ark Mariners No.105, meeting at Bury St Edmunds, celebrated its centenary. The name 'Edmondsbury is not a mis-spelling, but rather an affectation of the period, reflecting the various ways in which the name of the town was spelt in the eighteenth century, and reflecting a whim on the part of the founders, the principal of whom was Owen Aly Clark, the outstanding Bury Freemason of the twentieth century. The Lodge has met on the same premises over its hundred years of existence.

The Lodge was the second created in Suffolk, and the sixth in the Mark Province of East Anglia. Like all such Lodges it was attached to a Mark Lodge, in this case the Freeman Lodge, from which it takes its number. For many years it was merely an adjunct to the Freeman Lodge, meeting on the same evening, and its meeting followed the Mark Meeting, which usually meant that it was difficult to persuade the members to return to the Lodge room, after the Mark had been completed, to commence the Mariner Degree. Meetings often consisted of opening the Lodge, reading the Minutes, and closing the Lodge, and where there was a candidate the advancement ritual was often read and the floor work confused.

Some years ago it was decided that the simplicity and beauty of the Degree deserved better. The Lodge now meets independently and the effect is to persuade members that the Degree is of equal importance and substance with all other Masonic Degrees. The history of the Degree, and its roots within Freemasonry, are described in various Masonic publications.

Musical Mayhem at Hartismere



The dining room had been kept open for us and after a meal some of us retired to bed soon after midnight. Incidentally, when we arrived at Paphos Airport, Cyprus it was pouring with rain!

Wednesday, another overcast day but no rain, a coach trip in the morning visiting the old market and then to the harbour for a look round followed by lunch at the Pelican. Invited were the medic who had assisted our sick passenger, with his colleague and their wives (sisters). The wine flowed and the conversation grew louder before we collapsed into the coach at about 15.00 hours for a return trip to the Hotel and a sleep. Vaughan Pryce who had joined us for the first time entertained us to drinks in his suite that evening. Yes his was a suite, with lounge, bedroom, kitchen, bathroom and a second loo. Someone must have advised the Hotel management. A very pleasant hour or two before we retired to dinner, once again in the Hotel. They had been good enough to keep the dining room open on our arrival and we reciprocated. The whole staff, both dining and room service made us feel well at home. At this dinner, a new apprentice, Ralph Robertson, joined the two dangerous brothers, Bill Hagger and Peter Peck. Ralph was presented with his medal and a certificate, ably

Official Presentation of Wheelchair to Amber Paynter by the Provincial Grand Masters of Suffolk and Norfolk.

Amber was born 29 weeks prematurely and suffers from decreased mobility and partial sight, despite this she enjoys a good life and loves to play with her twin sister Holly. This new wheelchair which will last her until she is about 14 will mean increased independence and will therefore mean she can play with her sister and school mates a lot more. It will also be better for her hip joint which is very weak, Amber will have to undergo ongoing treatment for her hips as the joint is permanently dislocated. A combined fund-raising lunch for British and American Freemasons was held to help a girl suffering from cerebral palsy get the wheelchair she needs.

The lunch, at the Risbygate tennis and bowls club, in Bury St Edmunds, raised $\pounds3,000$ which will go towards a hi-tech $\pounds6,000$ wheelchair for five year old Amber Paynter.

A NEW TAIL PIECE



More lives will be saved by East Anglia's vital air ambulance after officials received generous donations from Freemasons in three provinces to help keep their facility in the air.

A total of \pounds 70,000 was raised in jut one year by groups in Suffolk, Norfolk and Cambridge - cash which will provide essential cover in rural, isolated communities around the region.

Brian Cave, fundraising manager for the East Anglian Air Ambulance, welcomed the donation, saying public support was essential to allow crews to reach casualties injured as a result of riding or farming accidents, who are often difficult to reach by road.

"Donations like this are really important, and go a long way towards keeping the ambulance in the air," he said.

"But every donation is equally important to us, whatever the size. The public are supporting us in a big way, as they really see the need for the service we provide."

"Although we are the newest air ambulance in the country, we answer more calls than any other facility in the country, which shows just how important the service is."

The ambulance, whose annual running costs of £750,000 are met through fundraising alone, was launched in January 2001 and has answered more than 100 emergency calls during each month since.



"We thought this was a very worthwhile charity within our local community," RWBro Robert Tile, Provincial Grand Master of Suffolk, who donated £15,000 to the cause.

"This is a lifeline facility for the people of East Anglia, especially as we have a large coast line which can be difficult to reach by road.

RWBro Ian Bruce, Provincial Grand Master of Norfolk, said his members had donated £25,000, with an additional £25,000 raised by 3,700 members in 72 different lodges during the year.

"The air ambulance is a brilliant facility, and we are rather proud we have managed to raise this money," he said.

RWBro Colin Hutchinson, Provincial Grand Master of Cambridgeshire, said £30,000 had been collected by members from the province as part of their ongoing fundraising efforts.

"Freemasonry is renowned for raising money, and we support our own charities as well as non-Masonic ones," he said.

"We thought the air ambulance was a very worthy cause."

MARK DEGREE SUPPORT FOR EAST ANGLIAN CHARITIES

A cheque for £7,000 from the East Anglian Mark Benevolent Fund was presented to Mr. Krishna Sehia at the Norfolk and Norwich University Hospital by R.W.Bro. Peter Rollin the Provincial Grand Master of the Mark Province of East Anglia.

Prior to the presentation Mr. Sehia gave a short illustrated talk about the prostate gland, the research that is being carried out to find the causes of prostate cancer and advances being made in its treatment. He said that the £7,000 given represented more than a third of the total amount given by the Government for prostate cancer research in 1999 and he intends to put the money towards the purchase of laser equipment to aid the treatment thus eliminating the need for surgery in some cases. It was particularly appropriate that Freemasons should be supporting research into a disease which effects one in three of the male population.

Total donations to non Masonic charities to the end of March this year were $\pounds16,500$ which include $\pounds4,000$ to the East Anglian Air Ambulance.
