Unfortunately as the gift had still to be suitably engraved the final hand over had to be a little delayed. The Deputy Provincial Grand Master, and the Master of Babergh Lodge, W. Bro. S. Please do not think it will be easy. We are currently allocating grants in excess of £3m per year to over 500 new applicants. In our last year the average cost of support to an applicant was £6,200. If we only allow for modest inflation between now and 2009 this average figure is likely to be about £7,300. If we only fund another 500 applicants in 2009 this will mean allocating grants totalling nearly £3.7m rather than the £3.1m last year. I firmly believe that the amount of support we provide will have increased further and therefore cost even more by 2009.

Bury St Edmunds Cathedral Service Evensong April 2006



I am not a Freemason. I therefore speak to you with respect and gratitude from outside. I habitually answer those who are critical of Freemasons that as a rule we should judge every organisation by the best we find in it, and not the worst; and that the best defence of the Masonic tradition so far as I am concerned is the people whom I have known. loved and respected. who have been Freemasons. They number, for example, an uncle; my loved parish priest, Bishop Edmund Sara; Dean Peter Moore of St Albans, who has just died: and a large number of parishioners. colleagues and friends past and present who in themselves seem to

The Evensong held at the Cathedral in Bury St Edmunds was very well supported with over 700 members, families and friends present. The event organised by the Provincial Grand Chaplain WBro George Pipe, had many months of planning.



The address was given by the V Rev Keith Jones, the Dean of York. As part of his address he said:

"This tower, to which you, the Freemasons of the Province of Suffolk have generously contributed, is one of the most needed constructions in England. I can hardly think of a town which so much needed a focus. Not that any of us, I am sure, are so snobbish as to think that there is not something rather sublime about the sugar refinery, wreathed in clouds; and not that any of us who appreciate beer would want to disparage the Greene King brewery stack; only that the people of St Edmundsbury must have been tired and embarrassed by pictures of St John's church, not an architectural success, being labelled in the newspapers as the cathedral, and it being so difficult to distinguish this delightful cathedral from the A14. But now it stands, and is a thing of beauty, and everyone should feel well disposed to the people of Suffolk who supported the appeal for it, and Dean James Atwell and his colleagues who managed it. And to you, for your significant part in it. And in that context, I have to add how grateful I am that you have given me the excuse to revisit Suffolk, and this cathedral of which I am proud to have been an Honorary Canon while I was vicar of St Mary le Tower Ipswich. And, by way of that, to express the kind regards of a Dean to the Freemasons who have been so friendly to this church and to many cathedrals up and down the land.

me to refute the more idle and indeed palpably ignorant accusations which are sometimes bandied about." You cherish long and intricate pedigrees to very ancient foundations in human civilisation. I leave you to enjoy those as you wish. The real history of your movement, where it emerges as an important force in British life, strikes me is magnificently eighteenth century. And none the worse for that. For the eighteenth century was the age of common humanity and the Rights of Man. Your first lodge in Suffolk was founded in the 1730s, which is exactly typical of the age when Masonic lodges were being founded in English towns."



THE BLUE CLOCK

On the wall of the Dining Room in the Masonic Hall, Soane Street there is mounted a blue faced clock, surmounted with masonic symbols, which hangs adjacent to a second white faced clock.

It is likely that many of the Brethren from Ipswich Lodges are themselves not aware of the story behind the 'two clocks' and are unable to answer the questions that come from curious guests and visitors, both masonic and nonmasonic as to why there are 'two clocks'. This article is intended to throw some light on the subject, not only to satisfy the curious question but also to enable informed Freemasons to extol the virtues of a truly important Masonic virtue namely 'Masonry Universal'.

In 1996, Caduceus Lodge No. 9536, a peripatetic lodge in the Province of Suffolk that comes to Soane St. once a year for its Installation Meeting, approached the then Chairman of the Ipswich Masonic Hall proposing the toast to the 'Queen and the Craft' at the Festive Board. This kind and generous offer was gratefully accepted by the Hall Co. and the picture was eventually brought to the Ipswich Masonic Hall.

However, and in the nicest possible way, that was when the problems began. Just exactly where should the picture be mounted?

At the time of preparing to hang the picture, the place in which it needed to be placed was occupied by the existing White Clock which had been in situ for more than fifty years!! Given that Ipswich Freemasons guard their traditions most zealously, it was easy to imagine the likely furore amongst them at the very thought of having their clock re-positioned. After all, for decades they had turned to that clock at the time of the 'nine o'clock toast'.

It was then that Divine intervention kicked in! The idea was conceived that perhaps the problem could be solved by having a second clock (blue) and that the two clocks should be positioned, either side of the picture of Her Majesty as can be seen today in the Dining Room.

The idea was that the arrangement would then become a representation of 'Masonry Universal', a massively important tenet embedded in masonic ritual, symbolised by 'Celestial and Terrestrial Clocks' representing time either side of the world, and presided over by Her Majesty the Queen.

Company Ltd. indicating that the Brethren of the Lodge wanted to present the Masonic Hall with a picture of Her Majesty the Queen and for it to placed in the Dining Room. It was intended to, and indeed does, provide a fitting focus for Masons at the time of But the story doesn't end there. From that point on, and having symbolised 'Masonry Universal' as described, it was always intended that, at some time, 'life' should be breathed into the display by actually connecting with Freemasons on the other side of the world. And so it came about that in November 2005, almost 10 years later, when Caduceus Lodge No.9536 was holding its Installation Meeting at Soane Street when one of the members of Caduceus Lodge was heard to mention that he was to visit New Zealand in February 2006.

This was clearly the long awaited opportunity to make that Masonic link with the other side of the world and thereby fulfil the pledge that had been made so long ago. On behalf of the Ipswich Masonic Trust a letter was sent to that same Brother inviting him and Caduceus Lodge to search for that link and to make contact with a Lodge in New Zealand.

The invitation was taken up and as a result Caduceus Lodge has done a magnificent job by formally linking with Wellington Lodge No. 1521 EC, New Zealand. The process of linking the two Lodges was done under the auspices of our own United Grand Lodge and as such the two Lodges are described as Reciprocating Lodges.

At the time of preparing for the visit to Wellington Lodge by the particular Brother, Caduceus Lodge were gathering together certain gifts and memorabilia to mark the occasion. It was at this time that The Ipswich Masonic Trust was invited to send a gift also.

It was then that the Trust Co., the Hall Co. and the Ipswich Masonic Club, each being a fundamental part of the Ipswich Masonic Hall, collaborated and decided that a very fitting gift would be a replica of the Blue Clock in the dining room and that the gift should go in the name of all Ipswich Masons. Such a clock was commissioned and then personally carried, by hand, all the way to New Zealand by the Brother from Caduceus Lodge and presented to the Brethren of Wellington Lodge. A presentation plate was also sent which reads as below:


This clock is presented to the Brethren of Wellington Lodge No. 1521 EC, New Zealand by 'The Freemasons of Ipswich' in The Province of Suffolk UK. February 2006 'Fraternal Greetings Across the World'

This largely brings the story of The Blue Clock, in itself, to a conclusion– however it is very much hoped that it is but the beginning of a heartfelt, lasting and meaningful relationship between Wellington Lodge No.1521 and all Ipswich Freemasons who, between them, number almost a thousand Brethren. It can be imagined that any Brother from the Province of Suffolk visiting Wellington Lodge would receive a truly Masonic welcome.

Equally important is the hope that the story throws a light on the need for all Freemasons to sustain the concept of 'Masonry Universal' which is so crucial to all of us in today's troubled world.



Offer your services to him, visiting the elderly, the infirm or sick, offering transport and assistance to Lodge Meetings and social functions to those who need to that service, find out why a Brother no longer attends Lodge meetings. In other words be pro active.

There will be times when further assistance is required. This is where the Provincial Almoner can be of assistance. He is a resource to be used for help information and guidance, just as are the other Provincial Officers, G.Secretary, G.Treasurer and G.D.C.

I hope in the future to organise meetings for Lodge Almoners in various localities throughout the province. These will be open to all, not just the Almoners.

Neil has just completed a charity walk on the West Highland Way followed by an ascent of Ben Nevis which has raised £3000.



It is a shame our original minutes have deteriorated as we were unable to turn the pages without them flaking and losing some of the lovely copperplate writing the Scribe E used to record the convocations. I might add that our later minute books are all in good condition. So Freemasons who are interested in the Masonic history look after your records correctly.
