15TH SEPTEMBER 7.30AM 8 members of Magi Lodge 9747 gathered at the Norfolk Showground in preparation for their annual trip to northern provinces, this year taking in Edinburgh and Newcastle.

This is the 10th consecutive year W.Bro. Ray Jackson has organised a group of Freemasons to make this pilgrimage. Initially called The Navigators, the group consisted of Suffolk and Norfolk Masons who's interest was to visit Lodges. Through these annual visits, the formation of a new Lodge was thought of, with the common purpose of it being a visiting Lodge. Hard work by some members, in particular W.Bro. Ray Jackson and W.Bro. Frank Barber, brought this idea into fruition. In 2001, the dream became a reality with the consecration of Magi Lodge 9747.

These annual visits have since been maintained and eagerly looked forward to and the group are still call The Navigators.

The visit to Edinburgh was of particular significance for W.Bro. David Hickinbottom. He joined Edinburgh City Police in 1968 and served on the Leith division where we stayed and worked in Portobello where the Lodge meeting was held. This visit brought back many happy memories.

Faithful Lodge Tracing Boards

At the November meeting of Silver Jubilee Lodge No 8811, held at Bungay, members and guests were honoured to have present the original tracing boards from The Norfolk Faithful Lodge No 85.

W.Bro Tim Baldry had made all the arrangements and gave a highly interesting lecture on the history of the Boards.

He told the meeting that they are thought to be the oldest dated ones in existence and are signed by the artist Barlow, and dated 1800. They were painted in oils on canvas and at the time of the Bicentenary meeting of the Lodge in 1953 appeared to be in danger of disintegration and so later were boxed and covered in perspex to preserve them. They are now only exhibited in the lodge on Installation meetings. The First and Third degree boards vary greatly from those in more common use and exhibit some emblems normally now associated with other degrees.

Silver Jubilee Lodge meets three times a year and is dedicated to Masonic research, for more details of their meetings contact the secretary, whose details are in the Provincial Year Book.

On Nov 6th, Bro. Paul Excell of the Lodge of Prudence No 388, ran 26.2 miles through the five boroughs of New York to raise money for Breakthrough Breast Cancer.

Breakthrough have a simple vision - a future free from the fear of Breast Cancer. This year, 40,000 women in the UK alone will be diagnosed with Breast Cancer and 1 in 7 women throughout their lifetime.

Breakthrough runs a £10M global research programme - based in the UK that is searching for cause and a cure to a condition that will have affected most people with loss of a close family member or friend.

Bro Excell was inspired to run by a local woman, who, despite being terminal herself, is raising funds to help future generations. "We owe it to them to drive for a future free from the fear of Breast Cancer", said Bro Excell

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n the London of 1788 amidst the accepted poverty, filth, pollution, drunkenness, violence and debauchery, emerged a group of enlightened people who set out to make the lives of those less fortunate than themselves somewhat better. Amongst the foremost of these was an ardent Freemason, W.Bro. Chevalier Bartholomew Ruspini who enjoyed the patronage of the Prince of Wales, becoming a founder of the lodge that bears that name. Through his idea and by his efforts a Freemasons' school for girls was founded in 1788. the School had the full backing of the Grand Master HRH Henry Federick, Duke of Cumberland, and became known as "The Royal cumberland School for the Daughters of Indigent Freemasons", later to be known as "The Royal Masonic Institution for Girls".

At the end of the first and very successful year in 1789, it was decided that the First Anniversary should be celebrated by a Church service followed by a banquet for the distinguished guests and the children. The collection made £29.2.3 and at the well attended dinner, £58.8.3 was raised, giving a grand total of £82.10.6. This was the First Anniversary Festival, **1789.** A Festival that has been celebrated every

year since, only ceasing in its own right in 1985.

In 1798, nine years after the founding of the Girls' school, W.Bro. William Burwood, together with other members of the "United Mariners" Lodge, established the "Institution for Clothing and Educating the Sons of Indigent Freemasons"; the beginning of the "Royal Masonic Institution for Boys". This Charity followed the anniversary fund raising Festival system as instigated by the "Girls". Unfortunately there are no records of the amount raised until the 8th Anniversary Festival in 1806, when a total of £33.9.6 was declared.

Following the success of the Boys and the Girls institutions in 1837, and with thanks to the initial work by W.Bro. Revd. Gilbert Gilbert, a unanimous decision was taken by Grand Lodge, which advocated the formation of charity called the "Asylum for the Aged and Decayed Freemason." However, the Grand Master, the Duke of Sussex, opposed the motion on the grounds that it would adversely affect the two institutions already in existence. Eventually a Masonic Anxiety fund for Brethren was opened in 1842, and one for their widows followed in 1849. A year later a home was opened in East Croydon. The two funds were joined together and became the "Royal Masonic Benevolent Institution". The First Anniversary Festival in 1843 raised the sum of £400.0.0 attracting 21 stewards.

Initially the festivals were held under the Patronage or Presidency of one of the Senior members of Grand Lodge, usually the Grand Master, but gradually as Freemasonry spread throughout the country, the Provinces wanted to show that they too could raise monies for the Charitable Institutions.

The first records of Provincial Festivals show

that: the RMIG in 1822 Dorsetshire declared £400.0.0; in 1837 Essex declared £1000.0.0, **the first £1000.0.0 Festival**. The RMIB in 1836 Essex declared £525.0.0; in 1838 Staffordshire declared £350.0.0. The RMBI in 1843 Northants & Hunts declared £400.0.0. In 1847 Essex declared £500.0.0.

The first £million Festivals were: the RMIG in 1972 East Lancashire declared £1,129,544.00. The RMIB in 1976 Yorkshire West Riding declared £1,120,220.00. And the RMBI in 1976 South Wales Eastern Division declared £1,508,825.00.

WHAT OF THE PAST FESTIVAL AFFECTING The province of suffolk?

So far we have hosted 10 Festivals: 1864 RMIG, Lord Waveney PGM, £3,300.0, 71 Stewards; 1874 RMBI, Lord Waveney PGM, £5,200.0.0, 135 Stewards; 1889 RMIG, Lord Henniker PGM, £5,354.0.0, 156 Stewards; 1903 RMBI, 3rd Earl of Stradbroke, £27,026.0.0, 736 Stewards; 1928 RMIG, 3rd Earl of Stradbroke, £44,049.0.0, 2131 Stewards; 1945 RMBI 3rd Earl of Stradbroke, £97, 073.14.3, 3909 Stewards; 1956 RMIB, 4th Earl of Stradbroke, £135,453.0.0, 4406 Stewards; 1970 RMIG, 4th Earl of Stradbroke, £23,680.0.0, 2950 Stewards; 1982 RMBI, 4th Earl of Stradbroke, £772,827.00, 2161 Stewards; 1996 MTGB, RJR Tile, £1,694,656.00, 1163 Stewards.

Every year, without exception each Institution has held an Anniversary Festival, the tradition not even being broken throughout the Great War and the Second World War. It was not until 1985 when a rethink of the Masonic Charities took place, when the needs of the membership and their families, the running costs of the Institutions, together with the social changes over the years, led to the change from the Three Great Masonic Charities to those four we have today.

THE FOUR GREAT MASONIC CHARITIES

1) **The Grand Charity**, which gives to Masonic and non-Masonic charities in the order of approximately 50% Masonic and 50% non-Masonic.

2) The Royal Masonic Trust for Girls and Boys, an amalgamation of the Girls and Boys Institutions.

3) **The Royal Masonic Benevolent Institution**, which retains its title, and looks after our older Brethren both in and out of Masonic homes such as Cornwallis Court.

4) **The New Masonic Samaritan Fund**, the aims of which are stated as: *The New Samaritan Fund is an independent charity which provides support for sick and infirmed Freemasons, their families and dependents who are in need. The Fund gives relief to those applicants who cannot afford full cost of private healthcare and who are unable to obtain their treatment on the UK's National Health Service without undue delay or hardship.*

These Four Masonic Charities continue the Anniversary Festival system that was stated with the foresight of W.Bro. Chevalier Ruspinit back in 1789, with the founding Girls School. The Festivals celebrating the anniversary of their own charity have continued unbroken each year since then.

As the 11th Earl of Scarborough said on his

Installation as Grand Master in 1951, "I cannot, however, avoid remarking that, owing to rising costs, the standards of our Institutions will only be maintained by even greater efforts in the future. The Craft has never failed in its duty- it is not Charity- to the more unfortunate of its members, and for that reason there is every ground for confidence, that the Practice of a Masonic Principle will be carried on, and that the Service which our Masonic Institutions have been founded to give, will not, in our time, be curtailed."

Brethren, please support our Masonic Charities, particularly the 11th Anniversary Festival of the New Masonic Samaritan Fund in 2009, which will be presided over by our own Provincial Grand Master, RW.Bro. Ian Barry James Ross.

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Off The Cuff Other Orders

Ancient and Accepted Rite Inspector General: V.W.Bro. Dr. Graham A. Bracewell 33° District Recorder: W.Bro. Gilbert Corbett 32° The Ancient and Accepted Rite, more familiarly know as the Rose Croix, developed in the 18th Century. It spread across Europe to the West Indies and thence to Charleston in the United States. It is based on a set of Constitutions reputedly formulated by Frederick the Great of Prussia in 1786.

The first Supreme Council (Governing Body) was set up in Charleston, U.S.A. in 1801. By the end of the 19th Century the Rite consisted of 33 degrees (levels of attainment) The Rev. Dr. Robert Thomas Crucifix brought the Rite to England in 1845, after receiving a Patent from the Supreme Council of the Northern Jurisdiction of the U.S.A. The oldest Chapter in our District is Victoria, No.22 founded in 1867. Incidentally it was supposed to be named 'Royal Victoria Chapter' after the reigning monarch of the period, but an inadequate clerk in the Supreme Council left 'Royal' off the Warrant by mistake.

If you consult the Suffolk Year Book form pages 283 to 293 you will see that the Suffolk District consists of 10 Chapters widely distributed around the County and I am sure you will find a Chapter reasonably close to where you live. In this county membership is only open to Master Masons who are Christians so if you fulfil these qualifications then why not consider joining this Order? If you glance through the list of Officers and Past Officers of a Chapter near you then I am sure you will discover someone you know who will only be too pleased to introduce you to Rose Croix Masonry. If not, then please do not hesitate to contact me, the District Recorder, address and telephone number with email address are shown on page 283 (blue Book) and I will be pleased to set the wheels in motion. There is a problem in that not all the names given in the Authorised King James Bible are used in the modern bibles. The chapter is considering this further as there is merit in the suggestion, but it is food for thought.

Consecration of a New Mark Lodge in the Province of Suffolk

On Thursday 2nd September 2005, a new Mark Lodge No.1866 was consecrated at Freemasons Hall Ipswich. The new lodge, which will meet during daytime at Stowmarket, was named Columbyne from Columbine Hall, a moated house near Stowupland an adjacent village to Stowmarket.

The different spelling came about because of recent development in Stowupland was called Columbyne Close and the Master Designate and Organising Secretary decided that if a modern builder could name a Close called Columbyne there was no reason that the successors of this ancient Brethren should not spell the name and their new lodge the same way!

It later emerged that the word columbine is a descriptive noun for doves, as bovine refers to cattle; ad that the plant columbine, or aquilegia, is so named because it's flowers resemble doves in flight. Co-incidentally, the names of the 2 crafts lodges at Stowmarket are Phœnix, a bird rising from its own ashes, and Ala, a wing.

The consecration Ceremony was conducted by the Right Worshipful Grand Master for the Mark Province for East Anglia, R.W.Bro. P.H. Rollin, assisted by the Deputy P.G.M. W.Bro. J.D. McKee, the Asst. P.G.M. W.Bro. Dr. J. A. Elmore, the P.G.D.C., W.Bro. C.G.Devereux, the P.G.Sec. W.Bro. I.H. Notley and other Provincial Grand Officers.

Thirty of the Thirty-two founders and their quests were present. W.Bro. McKee installed the Master Designate W.Bro. R. A. Jones as the first Master of the Lodge. The Master then appointed and invested his officers, including W.Bro. E.R.H. Hyner, as Senior Warden and W.Bro. A. J. Rolling as Junior Warden.



As most of you know, the RMBI runs the Cornwallis Court residential care home in Bury St Edmunds, but the RMBI provides more than just Homes.

Care Advice Team

The Care Advice Team was initially set up to help prospective residents and annuitants and now works increasingly alongside Lodge Almoners to help older Freemasons and their dependents. Over 3000 people living in the community benefit from this service.

Many people's problems can be alleviated by the advice and support offered by the Team. They work by visiting people in their own homes to offer their wide range of experience and knowledge relating to health and welfare rights as well as benefits. In addition to being able to advise about all aspects of the services offered by the RMBI, the Care Advice Team can advise on the services and benefits available from other statutory and voluntary agencies.

Respite Care

Temporary stays for respite or convalescence are also available in RMBI Homes. This has previously only been available for self-funding applicants or those in receipt of Local Authority funding. In recognition of the fact that it can often be difficult to get Local Authorities to fund respite care, the New Masonic Samaritan Fund has initiated a trial programme in conjunction with the RMBI. People in need of respite care, who are unable to gain Local Authority support and who cannot afford to meet the cost themselves, will be able to apply for help from the NMSF.

If you or someone you know would benefit from this service, they should call the RMBI to discuss an appropriate location. There will be an assessment by the RMBI to ensure that the chosen Home has the correct facilities to meet the individual's needs. At the same time there will need to be a financial assessment in order to determine eligibility for support from the NSMF.



It is the intention that once a respite need has been registered, subsequent stays will be offered according to need and the availability of suitable accommodation.

MASONIC JEWELS The Royal Masonic Institution for Girls

From 1900 until 1985 when the Girls merged with Boys to become The Masonic Trust for Girls & Boys, there was a Festival Jewel each year the exception being 1943 when there is no record of a Jewel or Certificate issued.

The Jewels made between 1900 and 1940 were made from silver and Hall Marked, after this they were made from base metals the exception being the war years when card or plastic was used. The Festivals were generally hosted by a Masonic Province with the P.G.M being the Chairman, on occasions this may have been a prominent member of the Craft.

The years of 1928 and 1970 saw the Province of Suffolk being host and the Chairman being The Rt. Hon. The Earl of Stradbroke on both occasions.

The amount announced in 1928 being £44,049 and in 1970 £233,680 quiet a difference. 1941 and 1942 saw badges made of cardboard and 1944 and 1945 the jewels were made of plastic and interestingly made by The London

Association for the Blind. In 1940 Grand Lodge circulated all Lodge secretaries asking for brethren to donate Masonic Jewels to the war effort these being melted down, some several thousand pounds being raised this way. Each donor was given a receipt for his offering.



A Steward for a particular Festival was given permission to wear his Jewel for his life time in his Province only.

Whilst Jewels for the Girls ceased in 1985 there are many available from different sources for any budding collector, antique fairs and car boot sales being good examples.

Lodge Museums and rooms often have good collections for viewing. Festival Jewels for the Girls in the main have a white ribbon but in the years 1911 1914 1917 and 1918 they carried a blue stripe. The 1904 Cheshire Jewel carried a Red stripe.

I hope this article will be of interest and stimulate collectors.
