


Double presentation at Cornwallis Court








Capel Mason Honoured



Book Review HISTORY OF LODGE

1008



An incredible book has just been published by WBro Brian Woodall. Brian has been the Provincial Archivist for the past 10 years, and has used his knowledge well to present this magnificent record of his own Lodge, Royal St Edmund No 1008.

The book extends to 388 pages and contains many illustrations and wonderful records of the Lodge. The method adopted by the author is to feature each Worshipful Master from 1864 and to give an insight into who they really were. What makes this book even more a good read is that each Master is set against the social background of that time.

Brian makes numerous references to the "lost" records and artefacts from his Lodge, and how being the diligent historian he is, has recovered numerous items from the dustbins which had been placed there by less diligent brethren over the years.

The cover has a picture of William Hubbard Lucia, the first WM of 1008. The photograph was taken in 1878 when he was appointed as the acting Grand Sword Bearer in the United Grand Lodge of England. He was also Provincial Secretary from 1870 until his death in 1883.

Another lovely piece of history is the reproduction of a letter, dated 21st June 1973, from Lord Stradbroke to WBro R W Elliott offering him the role of Deputy Provincial Grand Master.

I am sure that this book must be amongst the best Lodge Histories you will ever find. I have read lots of them and all I learned from them was lots of names from the past and what ceremonies were held.

This work is a must read for all those interested in how Freemasonry developed in West Suffolk, and the various characters involved.

As a footnote I find it very sad, reading that valuable Lodge records have been lost over the years. All our Lodges need to ensure that those boxes of old papers which are kept by the Secretary in his loft are dutifully passed on to his successor, or better still stored in a safe place for our future historians.

ALMONERS' AND MASTER MASONS' SEMINARS

The Province has now run a seminar for Master Masons from the Provincial Groups in Ipswich, Woodbridge and Felixstowe at Soane Street on 27 April and a weekend series of seminars for Almoners at Bury St Edmunds, Lowestoft and Ipswich.

The evening seminar for Master Masons was opened by the Provincial Grand Master, RWBro Barry Ross, supported by the Deputy Provincial Grand Master, VW Bro Robert Mayhew, who both joined with the brethren in a drink and an informal and personal chat at the buffet following the meeting.

Three talks covering Grand Lodge, Provincial Grand Lodge and Private Lodges and their working were given by W Bros David Boswell, Bernard Horstead and John Jarman, which were followed by a question and answer session.

The success of the evening has prompted the Provincial Grand Master to call for this seminar to be repeated in other venues in the Province with a wider audience. It is hoped that these can be held at Lowestoft and Bury St Edmunds in November or December.

Details will be forwarded to Lodge Secretaries and Provincial Group Representatives as soon as arrangements are confirmed.

The seminars for Almoners, run by the Provincial Almoner, W Bro Dr Mac Speake, were attended by 88 members representing nearly every Lodge in the Province.

While the Almoner seminars were judged a success by delegates, suggestions included providing more information on charities, state benefits, how social workers function, care for widows and widowers, the setting up and operation of Ladies' and Widows' Groups and about handling bereavement. Also requested were more discussion and time, case studies introduction pack for new Almoners

It became apparent that in some Lodges there is sufficient work to justify appointing an Almoner's Assistant. This would be a way for bringing on new Almoners.

Next year, it is hoped to hold a weekday evening meeting at a central location to allow those not able to come at a weekend a chance to attend.

STAMP DOWN ON LANZARO



W Bro Ralph Robertson reports on the latest expedition of STAMP, the travelling masonic group:

Twenty-five of the usual suspects from STAMP travelled to Lanzarote on 11 March, enthusiasm mounting as we got nearer our destination. This only increased as we met our hosts, the Master, W Bro Roger Dadswell and W Bro Peter Slade from South Porch Lodge, No 59, in the bar of our hotel in Arrecife. Peter is very active in island masonic activities and helped greatly in organising our visit. South Porch Lodge is an Englishspeaking lodge held under the Grand Lodge of Spain using Emulation Workings. Their membership is about 27 ex-pats who are resident on the island

The next day we took a coach trip taking in the volcanic area of the island followed, in the evening by a convivial meal at a local restaurant. STAMP traditions were observed and commemorative medals, with an updated clasp for "Lanzarote" were presented to Bill Hagger and Peter Peck. Absent brethren were remembered, in particular W Bro John Jarman who, despite being unable to travel, had been very much involved in the arrangements as usual. John had written a poem for Bro Peter "The Navigator" Seaman, reflecting his uncanny ability to find a short cut which

usually adds miles to the shortest of journeys! Peter was also presented with a specially commissioned compass that has a variable North that can be set at any point within 360 degrees.

On Tuesday we joined the members of South Porch Lodge. On our arrival, their building looked similar to an old lock up type garage. This was because it was an old lock up type garage and had been converted for their purposes into Lodge rooms, kitchen and bar area. The surroundings were not that important as the warmth of welcome extended to us was second to none and the ceremony of the highest standard. W Bro Dave Deal presented the Lodge with a gift and their Master with an inscribed gavel to commemorate the evening. In turn, we were presented a beautifully engraved mirror from the Master and brethren. We left after the meeting with a feeling that Masonry was alive and well in Lanzarote. We might even have converted them to singing Suffolk style!

Wednesday took us on another coach trip, further socialising, more presentations and conviviality (hard work this STAMP business - editor) before our return to Suffolk.

At the April meeting of the Lodge of Perfect Friendship, No376, 93-yearold W Bro Eric Davey celebrated his 50th year in Masonry almost to the day. The Provincial Grand Master, R W Bro Barry Ross, presented Eric with his 50th year certificate from the Province and gave a brief summary of his masonic career. Afterwards, WBro Forbes Powrie presented Eric with a decanter and glasses on behalf of the lodge and expanded on his personal and masonic history, including his year as Provincial Third Grand Principal and membership of other orders. It was a very happy and joyous evening enjoyed by all present, and truly in accord with the name of the Lodge.





In his address at the Annual Craft investiture on Wednesday 25 April, the MW The Grand Master, HRH The Duke of Kent, made a statement about the relationship of United Grand Lodge and Supreme Grand Chapter with the other orders in Freemasonry. He said:

GRAND LODGE AND OTHER MASONIC ORDERS

"The Preliminary Declaration of the Act of Union of the two Grand Lodges in December 1813 says that it was 'declared and announced that pure Antient Masonry consists of three degrees and no more', that is to say 'Entered Apprentice, the Fellow Craft and the Master Mason, including the Supreme Order of the Holy Royal Arch'. This has been the position for nearly two hundred years and will remain unchanged.

However, since many members of the Craft are members of these Orders, I am pleased to acknowledge formally their existence and regularity, and in particular their sovereignty and independence. The best known of these orders are: Mark, Ancient and Accepted Rite, Knights Templar, Royal and Select Masters, Royal Ark Mariner, Red Cross of Constantine, Allied Masonic Degrees, Order of the Secret Monitor and Knight Templar Priests. I also accept the valuable role they play in providing additional scope for Brethren to extend their Masonic research in interesting and enjoyable ways.

The Orders I have just mentioned are simply the best known and largest of those practised in London, the Provinces and Districts overseas. I am aware that there are in addition others that have a valid place in Freemasonry and with whom we enjoy a good relationship. What is important is that Brethren who join these other Orders still retain their membership of a Craft Lodge and I am pleased that the Orders will be encouraging their members to do so."



Around forty masons gathered at Lowestoft Masonic Hall on Thursday October 12th 2006 for the Consecration of Court of Anglecynn No. 11 in the Province of East Anglia of the Masonic Order of Athelstan.

With MW Bro Dr. Nicholas George, Sovereign Grand Master, in the Chair and RW Bro Roy Foster, Provincial Grand Master of East Anglia, acting as Grand Marshall, the colourful ritual was skillfully delivered, including a delightful Oration by RW & EmBro M H Roalfe, Eminent Grand Prior, on the subject of Anglecynn or Englishness. WBro Frank Barber was then installed in the chair, and the private business of the Court was conducted.

The day's labours concluded in a Festive Board attended by all. The toasts were taken in the usual Athelstan manner, that of having no reply, finishing with the toast to King Athelstan, first King of All the English.

TELL ME MORE

For those interested in other orders Forum has received two guides written, respectively, by WBro lan Foster and WBro James Fry.

WBro Foster's paper, entitled "The Separation of the Masonic Degrees" is an updated paper originally based on a talk given by WBro F A H Champkin. In its three pages it summarises background to, and relationship of, the various orders. Its brevity limits the depth of content but does provide a useful overview. The entitled "The Other paper Degrees" by WBro James Fry, who has been a regular contributor to this page, has been prepared with advice from leaders of the various orders represented in Suffolk, and offers a longer but still succinct tour of the subject.

He goes into more depth on the relationship between the various orders and their links with Craft Masonry as well as summarising the purpose, history, and activities of each order as appropriate and the qualifications for membership.


It cannot be very often to get three Past Grand Superintendents and a current Grand Superintendent from one Province together, let alone in a very relaxed atmosphere!
