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Finding Gunner Snow

In the way that "the earth had recently been disturbed" led to the finding of our Master, Hiram Abiff, this is a modern day story of a discovery and sacrifice.

My brother, Barrie, when initiated into Freemasonry, had had a long interest in the Great War regularly visiting the war graves in France and Belgium. Visiting Grand Lodge, he studied the Roll of Honour of Freemasons who had died in that conflict. There he came across Bro Frederick Snow, JW of St. Luke's Lodge, No. 225, recorded as Gunner FW Snow of the 166th Siege Battery who had been killed on 26 September, 1917 at the age of 37.

Local investigation revealed no relations of Frederick Snow. However, in September 2005, my brother took me to the grave in the Huts Cemetery in Belgium. There we planted a poppy cross on the grave with an inscription from St Luke's Lodge. We also left our details in the cemetery's address book. Two weeks later I received a letter from Frederick's grandson, Geoffrey Snow, living in Rochester, who had visited his grandfather's grave just days after our visit. He had been intrigued to find our poppy cross and reference to Bro Snow as Junior Warden of St Luke's Lodge, and contacted me. Here were the first steps to discovering so much more about our Junior Warden, but the next discovery was even more remarkable than the first.

Barely six or seven weeks later, the Secretary of St. Luke's lodge received a call from WBro Bill Hughes, our past Grand Superintendent. From among a random job-lot at a local auction, a framed photograph of Masonic brethren had been passed to him in which he recognised the banner of St Luke's Lodge, and he thought the lodge should have it. On closer examination an old newspaper was found stuffed into the back of the frame, dated 3 February 1917! Concluding that this picture was taken at the December 1916 Installation meeting of St Luke's Lodge, probably the four shown were the new Master, the Wardens and visiting Provincial Officer. Could this be our Bro Fredrick Snow in his Masonic regalia only months before his death in the battlefields of Belgium? This was, indeed, confirmed by further information supplied by Bro Snow's grandson,

The Masonic Peace Memorial and the Hall Stone Jewel

Last November 11th marked the 90th anniversary of the end of the First World War. It is appropriate that we look back to that period and the history of the Hall Stone Jewel.

In June 1919, a special Grand Lodge was held at the Albert Hall to celebrate the coming of peace. The MW The Grand Master, HRH the Duke of Connaught, absent through illness, sent a letter proposing that the best way of celebrating peace and the sacrifice of fallen Brethren would be to build a new home for Grand Lodge at the heart of the Empire. This would be funded by voluntary contributions.

The Masonic Million Memorial Fund was accordingly established to raise the sum required and a series of special jewels was authorised for both individual contributors and Lodges. The most famous was the Hall Stone Jewel and Collarette to be worn in perpetuity by the masters of contributing Lodges raising a minimum of ten guineas per subscribing member. This was a large figure then and would be worth several hundred pounds today. Individual subscribers received silver or gold jewels for contributions of more than ten or one hundred guineas respectively.

After much debate about where the new building should be it was agreed to redevelop the existing site in Great Queen Street. Various designs were considered with the contract finally going to the partnership of H V Ashley and Winton Newman with a design based on a steel frame clad in stone. It was to be one of the first steel framed buildings to be erected in England. A further boost to fundraising was made through a Festival and on 8th August 1925 over 7,000 brethren lunched at the Olympia in



West London. This is still the largest sitdown meal held in the British Isles. The sum then raised or pledged of £855,000 was announced at lunch.

Work began in 1927 and at a Grand Lodge meeting held at the Olympia on 14th July, the foundation stone for the new building was laid via an electrical relay. The building was completed in 1933 and named the Masonic Peace Memorial for it is not just the Memorial Shrine that commemorates the thousands of brethren who died on active service but the whole building itself. On the outbreak of the Second World War it reverted to being called Freemasons' Hall.

Freemasons' Hall is a Grade 2* listed building and is the only art deco building in London which has been preserved in its original form and still used for its original purpose. Apart from the special place it holds in English Freemasonry, it has become better known by nonmasons in recent years through its programme of concerts and exhibitions and its appearance in many television series such as Poirot and Spooks.

There are 1,321 Hall Stone Lodges and their names and numbers are inscribed on commemorative panels in the main ceremonial entrance vestibule of Freemasons' Hall close to the Memorial Shrine itself. Of these, three Hall Stone Lodges reside in Suffolk: Royal Clarence, No 1823, Gippeswyk, No 4254 and Priory, No 4618.

WBro Phillip Covell, recently appointed Provincial Representative of Group 7 of Suffolk Lodges, said how honoured he



was to wear the Hall Stone Jewel, not only in the memory of those who died in the war, but also the members of Priory Lodge who had contributed to the building of the memorial.

NEW WEBSITE UP AND RUNNING


The Provincial website has recently been completely re-designed and now has many new and attractive features. The basic details for all Suffolk lodges have been included with the ability to add further information as it becomes available.

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
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STAIVIP Invades Germany




Suffolk Order of Merit
