


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At the Provincial Grand Lodge meeting **WBro Keith Huxley** was appointed the first Provincial Grand Mentor for the Province.

JOTTINGS FROM THE P.G. Secretary

Our many visitors from other Provinces tell us that they particularly like to come to Suffolk because of our imposing venue and the warm hospitality they receive.



At the Provincial Meeting, the Provincial Grand Master presented three very worthy Brethren with the Suffolk Order of Merit. I am examining ways in which the 30 holders of this honour can be easily recognised, but I would suggest that in Lodge, their past commitment to Masonry could be acknowledged by inviting them to parade out of the Lodge immediately after the Grand Officers.

What is certain is that there will be increased pressures on the cost of Freemasonry, particularly at those venues where VAT has to be levied. Attending Lodge meetings regularly, followed by the Festive Board, is the crux of our Masonic fellowship and it would be disappointing to see a decline in the number of members dining.

I notice when attending meetings that some Brethren always bring a guest, whereas some either never or very rarely do so. I do urge us all to invite guests on a regular basis as they add not only greatly to the enjoyment of all attending, but also help with the cost of maintaining our premises by increased use of the bar and support of raffles, etc.

The Provincial Mentor, WBro Keith Huxley, although only appointed officially in June has been very busy since Christmas organising meetings with Lodge Mentors. The Provincial Grand Master has been strongly encouraging the scheme and I would suggest that we are all Mentors now and by maintaining contact with our members during the Summer, we will surely get off to a flying start in the Autumn.

As last year I would like to thank all the members of the Provincial Office for their continuing support and the Information Officer and Editor of Forum for this excellent magazine.

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Provincial Grand Lodge

The Provincial Grand Lodge meeting took place at Holbrook School on 4th June, once again in glorious sunshine and with almost all seats full and every Lodge in the Province represented.

After congratulating all the newly appointed or promoted Brethren for their past and future efforts on behalf of the Craft the PGM went on to thank those senior and long serving Provincial Officers standing down from their current offices: WBros Jervis Kay QC (Registrar), Richard Baker (Charity Steward), Andrew Catton (Assistant Secretary), Brian Woodall (Archivist) together with the retiring Group Representatives: WBros Keith Huxley (Group 1), Stephen Bayfield (Group 4) and the late Bernard Horstead (Goup 3). He especially commended WBro Baker



for his many years of effort supporting the Provincial Festival in aid of the Masonic Samaritan Fund. Not only was a great sum raised but the Province had achieved one of the highest per capita donations in the country. The Tercentenary of Grand Lodge in 2017 required all Provinces to send in accurate historical records. WBro Brian Woodall, as Archivist, was thanked for his work in managing this process for the Province and, as a consequence, for providing the Province with its own set of up-to-date records.

He was pleased to record a small increase in membership, especially in view of the economic climate. The Mentoring scheme was now in place across the Province and the appointment of a new Provincial Grand Mentor, WBro Keith Huxley, who had already been heavily involved in putting the system in place, had been charged with its implementation.

The EACH Treehouse appeal was commended by the PGM and is covered elsewhere in the magazine.

The PGM thanked the Deputy PGM and Assistant PGM for their support during the year and all those who had made the day a success: the Provincial Secretariat, the Provincial Grand Director of Ceremonies and the Provincial Grand Stewards Lodge.

Province Supports EACH Treehouse Appea

There can be few members in the Province who have not heard about the Provincial Grand Master's wish to support the East Anglia's Children's Hospices (EACH) Treehouse Appeal although not everyone may be aware of the background. EACH provides care and support for life-threatened children and their families. The Treehouse Appeal aims to raise in excess of £3 million to build and equip a brand new children's hospice for Suffolk and North Essex. They currently deliver care from a bungalow in Ipswich but this is small and there are not enough beds or rooms to deliver the dedicated specialist services required by families.

EACH has already been donated a fouracre woodland plot located between Felixstowe Road and Bixley Road in Ipswich from a local charitable trust. The charity now needs to raise £3 million to make this project a reality.

At the appeal launch, Melanie Chew, EACH Director of Fundraising, said: "The current EACH hospice in Ipswich has played a vital role in the delivery of children's hospice care services across Suffolk and North Essex since it was opened as a pilot project in 1999. Demand for the care and support we provide has increased and we have subsequently outgrown our current building. We currently care for more than 80 families in Suffolk and North Essex, but there are more than 400 in the area that could benefit from our support. The Treehouse Appeal can make this happen. With the donation of land we are well on our way to seeing our dream come true. I am now appealing to people all over the region to help us raise the funds needed to complete the project."

The contemporary new hospice will be set in mature woodland, allowing children and their families to relax and spend time together in a tranquil setting where first class care and accommodation will be delivered. It will provide overnight accommodation and private support areas for families as well as increased specialist equipment and improved facilities. each

Master, RWBro Barry Ross, has commended the appeal to the members of the Province stating: "We all know what a worthy cause this is and I feel sure that we will support this with the same enthusiasm as was shown for the Festival in aid of the Masonic Samaritan Fund."

The new Provincial Charity Steward, WBro Peter Gosling, who will manage the Provincial Appeal, added: "The appeal will last two years with a target of £100,000. It is gratifying to record that so many Lodges have already made considerable donations and that Provincial Grand Chapter and other orders have shown their support for this very worthy cause. Members should make any donations through the Province, rather than directly to EACH, so that we can keep a proper track of donations and that we can add any applicable Gift Aid."



Doric Lodge



Wednesday 14th April 2010 saw the renewal of an old Masonic tradition once practiced in Woodbridge of initiating servicemen garrisoned within the cable tow of Doric Lodge and its predecessors.

It would seem that the Lancashire Militia came to Woodbridge in 1803 bringing with them their own Military Lodge, No 309, to which became attached several civilians of the town. It is perhaps not surprising that there were Military Lodges in the location. Woodbridge was at that time a significant military station. Bromeswell Camp held at least four Regiments, and Woodbridge Barracks were built to accommodate 7,000 cavalry and infantry. Latterly, American servicemen were stationed at Woodbridge and Bentwaters.

23 Regiment (Air Assault) Royal Engineers are now stationed at Rock Barracks near Woodbridge as part of the Army's 16 Air Assault Brigade. This has resulted in a new influx of service personnel into the local area and the first initiate, and hopefully not the last, was Captain Neil Thomas MBE. Since his arrival in Suffolk, Neil has become involved in many local charities and community projects, particularly those concerned with children and adults with disabilities. He represented Great Britain in power lift and won world titles in 2005 and 2006. In March 2009 he was awarded the MBE for services to the Community and the Army.

Neil has family connections to masonry. His Uncle, WBro Anthony Taylor, is the Provincial Secretary of Oxfordshire and was present on the night.

Local boy makes good

Forum has just heard from Peter Rogers, a former local boy, who on 12th June was appointed Deputy District Grand Master, Athabasca District in Canada.

Peter, who was born in Great Yarmouth in 1952, was educated



at Technical High School (now Oriel Grammar) and after further education was employed by Great Yarmouth Publicity and Entertainments Department. He was ultimately promoted to Manager of the Marina Theatre. He moved to Martham while still with the department and it was in this period he was initiated into Freemasonry in St Mary's Lodge in Great Yarmouth in 1976 by his father who was Master that year.

After emmigrating to Canada in 1982 he became affiliated with Balmoral Lodge, No185. He became Master of Balmoral Lodge in 1988 and remains an active member. He has chaired the lodge charity committee for the last 10 years as well as the Balmoral Lodge Education Bursaries scheme. Peter is an active member of the AI Shamal Shriners AANOMS and is the treasurer of the TLC Corps, AI Shamal Shriners. He served as the Chairman of the Speakers Bureau for two years and Deputy PR Chairman for AI Shamal in 2008.

After a very successful career in Information Technology of over 30 years Peter took early retirement from IBM Global Services in February 2010.

He is married with two children and two grandchildren. He claims that between his years in IT and bringing up two sons he feels that he gained his grey hair honestly!

Review of 'Brother, whence come you? A history of Sudbury Freemasonry & our home',

by Peter Thorogood, published at £15.



I imagine that every Suffolk Freemason knows Peter Thorogood, many will know him as a researcher and a student of Freemasonry, who has built up a considerable authority. This book is his latest project, and he brings to it all the insight and humour which is his hall mark.

History has several functions. Firstly an account of people and events and the impact of those people and events at their own time, and on the future. Secondly, a revision of received knowledge, in order to provide an alternative account of those people and events, in other words to make us think again.

The telling of a history should persuade the reader that the story is worth the telling, that is worth attending to, that it has something of interest to us, that we shall be the wiser for so reading, and in this process the style of the telling is crucial. No one wants to read a book that is boring, humourless, the mere recitation of names and dates. So often histories of Lodges overlook this last consideration and make no appeal to a wider audience. They do not sufficiently explain or inform.

Peter Thorogood's story takes certain key elements in the story of Freemasonry in Sudbury. The choice of material is excellent. It is humorous and easy to read, it is informative, it illuminates people who, and events which, were crucial in the development of the Craft in the town. It is not merely a chronological unfolding, but rather expands certain key events, providing flesh for the skeleton. It is a history which moves well beyond Lodge Minutes, and ties the history of the Craft in the town to events within the town. In other words it places Freemasonry in it's context, that is within the society in which it has its roots, a feature that is commonly lacking from many such histories. It is well presented and extensively illustrated.

The history should be on every Sudbury Mason's bookshelf, since it reveals events hitherto unknown until Peter's book reveal them. but more, it should be owned by everyone who claims to have an interest in Freemasonry, since the book moves beyond the purely local and has a universal appeal. One does not have to be a Sudbury Mason to enjoy and be informed by this book. It has a universal appeal, and I have no doubt that the author will soon be ordering a reprint.

New Minibus for Heathside School in Ipswich

One of the members of St. Lukes Lodge had a relative attending the school which provides a very good education for children with physical/mental difficulties. They were in need of a new minibus and requested that the Lodge consider supporting their efforts to raise the funds. After necessary due consideration and a meeting with the head teacher, the Lodge set a target to raise £10,000 in a year. This target was achieved through various functions: a golf day, Ladies night, student walk from Bury St. Edmunds to Ipswich, a barbecue, and other lodge and individual donations.



The bus was delivered in February 2010. In the words of the head teacher it is 'an all-singing all-dancing vehicle' with all the refinements needed to transport the children in comfort either in their wheelchairs or on adjustable seats. It means that the children can continue to be part of the local community and are able to reach their own potential with respect to the extended learning activities available to them.

The bus has the words "lpswich Freemasons working with the Community" and the Provincial Logo, on both sides. WBro John Elmore represented the Craft at a small gathering to see the finished bus and representatives from the Lodges who contributed were there also to hear the head teacher thank Freemasons for their efforts. The bus can be seen daily in and around lpswich and our message is seen daily by the community we support.

Victor Farmer: Grand Superintendent of Suffolk, 1968 - 1974.

Victor Grand Farmer, former Superintendent of Suffolk, was remembered at an Abbot Baldwin Chapter at the end of last year where his life and Masonic career were commemorated in an address by EComp Brian Woodall and a display of associated memorabilia. The Patent appointing him Grand Superintendent of Suffolk had been held in the Masonic Hall at Framlingham. The Companions who meet at Framlingham, supported by EComp Mike Manley, thought that it should be reunited with Victor's Craft Regalia which has been displayed for some years at the Masonic Hall in Bury St Edmunds. The framed Patent is now displayed along with Victor's Craft Regalia at Bury. The story of Victor's life has been taken from Brian Woodall's address.

Victor was born in 1898. educated at Framlingham School, served in the Suffolk Regiment during the First World War and joined ICI in China in 1921 where his father, William, was the Manager of the Peak Hotel in Hong Kong. He was a keen collector of Chinese artefacts. In 1925 he married and moved around China finally reaching Tien-tsin and eventually rising to Company Chairman.

Initiated in the Star of Southern China Lodge No 2013 in 1923, he joined Sungari Lodge under an American constitution in Manchuria in 1930. In 1933 he

joined the Coronation Lodge, No.2931, English Constitution, which was held at Tien-tsin becoming Master in 1935. He joined the Northern Lodge of China in Shanghai in 1940, the same year that joined the Old Framlinghamians Lodge, and was appointed District Grand Master of Northern China in 1946. He was exalted in Jubilee Chapter No. 2013 in Canton in 1923, joined the Northern Crown Chapter 2931 in 1935, becoming First Principal in 1938. He rose to become Grand Superintendent of that District in 1946.

The area was occupied by the Japanese in 1937, but they tolerated foreign concessions up to 1941. Where was Farmer, I wonder? Was he still in China? If he had stayed it is more than likely that he would have been interned. Interestingly Farmer appears to have been granted an extension to stay in China, after the communist takeover in 1949, and was even granted permission to transfer his valuable collection of Chinese artefacts to England in 1953, the same year that his wife died. Farmer, appointed to District Grand Master of China in 1946 was to have but a short reign as his role officially ended in 1951.

In China, he joined both the Mark and Knight Templar Orders, but it is not known whether he continued in these Degrees on his return to Suffolk.

He returned to England sometime after 1949-50. As well as becoming Master of Old Framlinghamians in 1957, he is described in the Provincial Register as a member of Lodge 2931, now erased. He joined the Henniker Chapter in 1955, and was Grand Superintendent of Suffolk from 1968 to1974. Farmer was perfected in the St Edmund Chapter Rose Croix in 1970. 1964 he In joined Royal St Edmunds Lodge, remaining member until his death in 1977. In its register he is

described as a member of the John Bunyan Lodge, No.5973, Bedfordshire, but there is no mention of this elsewhere.

In his retirement he joined the Church of England. He was made a Deacon in 1961, and ordained in 1962. He served the parish of Stradbroke with Horham Athelington from and 1961-63. convenient for his membership of OF's and Henniker Chapter. He moved subsequently to the parish of St James in Bury St Edmunds where he was a Chaplain from 1963-67, and was made a Minor Canon in 1967. Two years after joining the Cathedral he was appointed Rector of Whepstead with Brockley in West Suffolk, in which he served from 1965-71.

ICE (In Case of Emergency - help others to help you)

The Provincial Almoner, WBro Mac Speake, came across this idea which he felt should be more widely publicised:

In an emergency, should you be unable to communicate or be unconscious, it can be very difficult for the emergency personnel dealing with you to access your contact details. Most people nowadays carry a mobile phone with their contact numbers in the directory. It is recommended that you put your contact details under "ICE" or if more than one "ICE 1", "ICE 2" etc.

The emergency services are aware of this.

Centenary for Albert

The 100th birthday of WBro Albert Jones of Ala lodge in Stowmarket took place on 2nd April. Celebrations were held at Woodfield Court Residential Home in Stowmarket where he lives. The Mayor of Stowmarket and other guests attended. On 1st April 2010, so as not to clash with the formal celebrations, members of Ala Lodge attended at the home for a tea party with Albert. Also in attendance were the PGM, RWBro Barry Ross, and the Provincial Grand Superintendent, EComp David Watson. Both Provincial officers congratulated Albert on his 100th birthday and on his service to Stowmarket masonry. The Grand Superintendent presented Albert with the Order of Merit and a tankard to mark the occasion.
