PRESENTATION TO AIR AMBULANCE

N THE 17TH OF JULY, Suffolk Freemasons presented East Anglian Air Ambulance with a grant of £4000 from the Grand Charity. This is part of a total of over £1,000,000 that has been donated to these services since 2007. Every Air Ambulance charity in England and Wales has received funding.

Air Ambulances fly over 19,000 missions every year and are without doubt one of the busiest of voluntary services. Their costs are met almost entirely from donations.

This will be a very special year for the East Anglian Air Ambulance as they will

be the first in England and Wales to undertake night flying. This will involve very special training for the crews in order to gain experience in the use of the special night flying equipment.

Speaking about the donation, the Provincial Grand Master, Barry Ross, said: "Air Ambulances play an important role in ensuring people get the medical help they need as quickly as possible. For those in life-threatening situations this can dramatically improve their chance of survival, especially as the East Anglian Air Service will now be undertaking night flying operations."

Suffolk Masons and the Grand Charity are delighted to, once again, be contributing to the continued provision of this excellent service and we Suffolk Masons would like to extend our sincere gratitude to the East Anglian Air Ambulance team for all that they undertake on our behalf.

Ipswich Heritage Open Day

SATURDAY. SEPTEMBER 2012, Masonic Hall Ipswich Ltd, the company responsible for the administration and management of Ipswich's Freemasons Hall, once again opened up Freemasons' Hall in Soane Street to the public from 10.30am to 4.00pm. This was done as our contribution to Ipswich's Heritage Open Day when local buildings of historical and architectural interest are opened for the public to informally visit and see what lies behind doors that are normally closed to them. This is the very positive contribution that the directors of Masonic Hall Ipswich Ltd feel that they are making to enlighten the public at large to the truth about Freemasonry and the very positive contribution that Freemasonry and Freemasons make to society at large.

Once again the venture proved to be a great success and certainly did a great deal to blow away the misconceptions that many people still harbour regarding the part that Freemasonry plays in our society. Some 230 individuals, mostly members of the population of Ipswich. were given a conducted tour of the main rooms of the building. The Temple, in particular, was much admired and the overwhelming opinion was that we have custody of a beautiful building. Our visitors, by and large, were extremely grateful for the opportunity to be shown round and were amazed to find that our Grand Charity was the second largest donor

organisation in the country after the National Lottery. They were similarly surprised at the extent of our charity with regard to non-masonic organisations. They were likewise delighted to have their questions about the nature of Freemasonry answered in a frank and open manner.

Tydeman, Arthur organised the Open Day, and provided an information sheet for the visitors, had set up an exhibition in the Robing Room which laid great emphasis on the charitable aspects of Freemasonry. This included detail of the contribution (more than £170,000) by Suffolk Freemasons to the Treehouse Appeal with pictures of the Provincial Grand Master handing over cheques to the CEO of East Anglian Childrens Hospices. The example of the masonic Teddies that we provide for children admitted to the A & E Dept of Heath Road Hospital was much admired. Details of our national support for causes like Air Ambulance -£1.000.000 since Parkinsons Research - £250,000; the Hospice movement - £9.3million since 1984; Emergency Relief Grants, eg Pakistan Flood Relief. Haiti Hurricane Relief, etc, altogether totalling some £2.657million 2011 in made considerable impact. Especially when it was pointed out, using items from Forum, that these national contributions were being backed up by local initiatives providing assistance to good causes at local level.

A number of visitors were very pleased to be able to make enquiries

via our archives and obtain information about relatives and ancestors who had been local Freemasons and their role in the organisation.


The opportunity was also taken to emphasise that the facilities of Freemasons Hall were not solely for the enjoyment of Ipswich Freemasons. Freemasons Hall was available for hire for appropriate use and was meant to be be seen as part of Ipswich's wider architectural heritage. The population of Ipswich were certainly welcome to share it with us. For our part, we recognise the need to make Freemasons Hall more commercially successful in order to safeguard its future and the future of Ipswich Freemasonry.

The success of the Open Day would not have been possible without the enthusiastic and willing assistance of the following Brethren who gave of their time and acted as Stewards. CRIMESTOPPERS VOLUNTEER GOES THE EXTRA MILE AND RAISES £900 FOR THE CHARITY



PROACTIVE Crimestoppers volunteer from Haverhill, Suffolk, has driven from Lands End to John O'Groats in a Crimestoppers branded car to raise much needed funds for the independent crime-fighting charity.

Eldon Mackridge, Secretary of Royal Clarence Lodge, No 1823, meeting in Clare, was the fundraiser and Suffolk Crimestoppers volunteer. He turned 75 in September and took on the drive for his birthday. The 850 mile journey from Cornwall to the Scottish Highlands kicked off on 8th September from Lands End and took 3 days to complete.

Prior to the expedition Eldon staved in a bed and breakfast the night before just 12 miles from the starting point. In an act of utter coincidence the venue, which Eldon chose at random, was owned by someone who used to be chair of an East Midlands Volunteer Committee some years ago. Eldon remarked: "Crimestoppers is such a small charity with only six-hundred volunteers UK wide, so it really was amazing to stumble across another supporter."

The first night was spent in Gloucester and the second night was spent in Perth, with a race to the finish at John O'Groats the next day at 2.30pm.

Crimestoppers Eastern Regional Manager, Ann Scott, said: "This was a great initiative thought up by Eldon. We are so grateful for the lengths our volunteers go to in order to raise our profile. Eldon is raising money for Crimestoppers so that we can continue to fight crime and make a difference in our community. Many people do not realise that we are an independent charity, but think we are part of the police or the TV programme. We need to raise funds in order to promote the vital anonymous service that we provide and pay the rewards available for information given to us.'

She added: "With 23 arrests being made every day from information given to Crimestoppers the charity plays a significant part in getting criminals off the street. The charity has many active and passionate volunteers, like Eldon, who give up their own time to promote the charity. Eldon commented: "I am very pleased with the amount of money raised - you always worry that you won't raise a penny! There is still time to donate and help fight crime in Suffolk. I thoroughly enjoyed the whole experience and I'm already planning my next fundraising adventure.'

As a result of this fundraising event The Lands End to John O'Groats Association will be awarding Eldon with a prestigious award for 'Oldest Fundraiser' at their AGM in January.

N SEPTEMBER, members of Brett Valley Lodge, together with their wives spent a very enjoyable day on a 'Guided Walking Tour of Historic Harwich' organised by their WM WBro Robert Barham. After a morning coffee on 'The Halfpenny Pier' we set off around Harwich lead by Tour Guides David and Jackie White, where we learnt that the brewer 'Tolly Cobbold' was originally 'The Harwich Brewery Company', founded by Thomas Cobbold in 1723, but finding a problem with the local water supply moved to its home in Ipswich in 1746. We were also shown the home of Christopher Jones, born in Harwich, who eventually became the master of the 'Mayflower' - the famous ship which in 1620 took settlers to Plymouth, Massachusetts.

Other places visited included the Electric Palace Cinema, the site of the old shipyard, and the Redoubt, an impressive circular fort built to defend the port against a Napoleonic invasion.

All in all the tour by the 'Harwich Society' really is excellent and if like me, you have not been to Harwich lately it is highly recommended!

Understanding your Horse's Emotions



NDERSTANDING the emotions of a horse is not a requirement of becoming a good mason but it was a subject that Larry Bensusan of Gainsborough Lodge, No 9332, in Sudbury decided to embark on.

Larry has for nearly 20 years treated horses in the racing industry, police horses, international three-day eventers, dressage horses, show jumpers, driving horses, the famous and the not so famous. He has often wondered what these magnificent beasts were thinking and it was this notion that started his quest for understanding the horse's emotions. He started by looking at the scientific research that recorded how a horse responded to its environment and to us humans, and found some startling characteristics of the horse that are often overlooked by owners and riders.

Larry went on the write a book on the subject Understanding your Horse's Emotions, which is published by J A Allen. Larry said, "the book helps the reader takes the first steps on a journey of discovery. If we understand the way horses see the world - in every sense of the world - we can unlock the key to their emotions and understand what prompts them to do certain things".

In his next book he suggests that he tackle understanding the emotions of that elite group – the Grand Officers.



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Provincial Shoot

HE DAY DAWNED BRIGHT AND CLEAR with light winds for the 5th Annual Clay Shoot and this year was the first time the event had carried Provincial status. The first ever Suffolk Provincial Clay Shoot, having received approval from our Provincial Grand Master, was held on Saturday 26th May 2012 again at the John Bidwell Shooting School at Hinton near Saxmundham.

the prizes which were presented by our Provincial Grand Master, RWBro Barry Ross, who attended, for the first time, with his son Simon.

Just to show how successful the shoot is in creating friendships consider this comment from someone who had never been before 2012: "I arrived not knowing anybody and I was quickly made to feel at home and very welcome. I much enjoyed the day." So why not come along next year? If you have never shot before that's not a problem – simply say NOVICE on your entry form and you will be given very special attention by experts in the art.

The date for 2013 is Saturday, 15th June and you are asked to book this date in your diaries now. Further improvements are currently being considered and, for example, the organisers hope to provide novice shooters with their own 30 bird sporting shoot plus tuition from a CPSA coach. We especially wish to see more ladies join us and they too will be given coaching if they have not shot previously. The provision of a barbeque is also currently being considered.

BARRY'S JOURNEY

story of ENDURANCE as related to WBro Mac Speake, Provincial Almoner, and published with the full consent of WBro Barry Cutler, his Daughter and Son.

The journey through which Barry and his family have travelled over the last few years has been, to say the least, difficult.

Because masonic charitable giving is a private matter it rarely comes to the notice of Brethren generally and there are complaints that we give a lot but seem to receive nothing in return. I hope this article will go some way to remedy this.

Barry was a fit young man married to Carol with two children, Diane, now aged 12, and William, now aged 8. They lived in Hadleigh and everything was going well. Barry was employed as a driver and mechanic and Carol was a nurse working at Angelsea Heights in Ipswich. Barry lost his Father at 54, when Barry was 17, from heart trouble. His mother suffered a hereditary condition called polycystic kidneys which resulted in kidney failure necessitating a transplant in 1998 which was successful, but she contracted an infection whilst in hospital and died from it. A few years later Barry was found to have high blood pressure and it was discovered that he had polycystic kidneys as well. Over the next couple of years he went into kidney failure requiring peritoneal dialysis then haemodialysis. During his time on peritoneal dialysis he had an attack of peritonitis and was admitted to hospital on Christmas Eve. He was allowed home on Boxing Day and WBro.Jack Clarke, Prov.DGDC happened to be in the hospital visiting someone else, so he brought Barry home. Serendipity? Barry's maternal uncle also has had a kidney transplant for this condition; one of the first performed.

In 2005 Carol developed a mole on her right leg which was extensively removed. All was well for a few of years but in 2010 she developed a swelling in her right groin which proved to be lymphatic spread from the melanoma. This was removed and she had chemotherapy. A subsequent scan showed all was well but a couple of months later she became breathless and scans revealed the tumour had spread extensively. From Carol being Barry's carer he became hers but they really cared for each other.

Carol wanted to go on a last holiday with the children so after Easter 2011 they all went to Butlins and had a wonderful time. Chemotherapy and a trial



drug at Addenbrooks were not successful and she died on 5th August 2011. The Red Cross 'Home from Hospital Scheme' was a great help at this time with the children. Also Carol's Brother died a few months later from Cancer.

Barry had a kidney transplant on 11th December 2011 which has been successful.

In his younger days he was asked to become a trainee golf professional but the pay was poor. He played off 4 and hopes to start again soon. He takes the children match fishing and assists with Speedworth Racing.

He tells me that he has had wonderful support from Freemasonry. WBro Robert Clubb and Bro Paul Smith, DC and Almoner of Court Knoll Lodge, and after the transplant from WBro David Merrygold, Tyler and Mentor of the Lodge. The Treasurer of Brixton Lodge, WBro Bob Lloyd was also a great support and read a lesson at Carol's funeral.

Barry was initiated into Court Knoll Lodge in May 2003 and became Master in 2009. He was subsequently Treasurer. He is the Master of Brixton Lodge meeting at Clerkenwell and has been asked to continue for another year. He is a member of Priory Chapter in Sudbury. In 2009 he helped Robert Baker put the signs out for the Festival celebration..

Barry says that Freemasonry has supported him and his family through renal failure, renal transplant and the death of his wife. He receives a grant from the Freemasons Grand Charity to help with day to day living expenses. Lowestoft **Improvements**

ISITORS TO THE LOWESTOFT MASONIC CENTRE will not have failed to notice the considerable improvements that have taken place over the last 18 months including a new entrance, Tyler's room and much improved toilet facilities. The work undertaken thus far represents the completion of Phases 1 and 2 of a four point plan to which the Board of the Lowestoft Masonic Hall Company are committed. Future plans include improvements to the kitchen and, possibly, enlarging the dining room to make it more desirable to attract non-masonic functions as well as providing better facilities for the members.

Funding for the works to date has been subscribed by the Lodges based at the venue, particularly a grant of £20,000 from Lodge of Unity, No.71. Additionally, the trustees of the George Setterfield trust have made the Company an interest free loan of £90,000 to be repaid over a period of 18 years or so which allows the Company to comfortably spread the costs. The monies for the remaining stages will have to be raised through the lodges and already this is beginning to happen under the leadership of the Company Chairman, WBro Colin Hall of Orient Lodge. Several of the social functions arranged by WBro Colin and held at the hall



over the last two or three years have been for the benefit of the fund including the popular St George's Night and Burns Night events.
