# RMBI FESTIVAL REPORT



from WBro Neville Warnes, Chairman Festival 2019

URING THE CURRENCY OF THIS ISSUE OF FORUM WE WILL BE LAUNCHING THE RMBI FESTIVAL 2019 at the Valentines Ball to be held at the Suffolk Showground on 15th February and we look forward to seeing as many of you there including, it should be noted, non Masonic friends who are welcome to any Provincial festival event,. This is an exciting time and there is much to do and a lot going on.

There are undoubtedly many relatively new masons and companions in the Province who have never experienced a festival. Every year a few selected Provinces in England and Wales hold a festival in support of one of the four main Masonic charities. This festival system is designed to spread the load evenly over the 47 Provinces in the two countries, and ensures a regular flow of income to each of those charities. It also allows those Provinces not in festival to donate to other charities of their choice. The monies raised by the festival system means a significant contribution can be made to help that charity achieve its aims. Our festival will culminate in 2019 after 5 years of fundraising, and investment of a considerable amount of time and effort by Lodges and individuals.

By the launch date it is planned to have a dedicated web site www.festival2019.co.uk it will communicate everything necessary to help you understand what the festival is doing, what the RMBI does for us and what we, as the Province of Suffolk, will be doing over the next five years, in order to offer it our support. I will not dwell too much upon the RMBI details here, because everything can be found through its own website, www.rmbi.org.uk Additionally, information about its work in our Province can be supplemented by speaking to our Provincial Almoner or Charity Steward who can also tell you about RMBI's Cornwallis Court, a facility we are so lucky to have within our Province.

The Festival will be managed by three Teams, dealing with Events, Information and Publicity, and Merchandising. The names of those Members running these Teams, and their remits, may be one of the early matters you will find on the site, and road-shows about the Charity and the Festival, can also be arranged within Lodges through our Information and Publicity Team Manager.

The Web pages will also inform you of anything you can do in supporting RMBI and keep you up to date with all details related to forthcoming Provincial Events. It will equally advise you about the results of previous ones, and let you know how our overall fund-raising is being achieved. It will also offer you, and your families and friends an opportunity to provide articles about anything you have in progress, whether it is the individual Lodge, Groups, Holy Royal Arch, Social, cheque handovers, whatever. Please, just submit it. The WebMaster info@ansta.co.uk will endeavour to include whatever he can at an appropriate time, because we will be looking to provide pages which offer good practical advice mixed with details about your fund raising ideas and financial achievement. Our Publicity and Information Team will provide this through a high quality site, easy to navigate, regularly updated, incorporating photographs, and combining more serious details of the Festival with articles showing that we are also gaining a great sense of fun and enjoyment in working towards a goal which can only be achieved through Team effort.

Brethren, this is your site, please make use of it and return to it as frequently as you are able, because there will be several additions in the future, such as honorific qualifications, details regarding the Jewel, messages from Provincial Officers, and a great deal more.

When I was invited to organise Festival 2019 I accepted without hesitation, because I know

that the members of the Province of Suffolk make a formidable team, and when supported by families and friends, frankly, we are unstoppable.

In closing, I will revert to the RMBI, now almost 170 years old, and dedicated to the care of older Freemasons, their wives, widows and other dependants through its 17 Homes having 1,000 Residents, and with a further 2,000 Beneficiaries in the Community, receiving pastoral care, respite care, visits from the Care Advice Team, expenses-paid holidays-high quality care and support and home loans available to those suffering from advancement in age - dementia.- nursing care - and ensuring they all have the benefit of choice - dignity - respect and control over their own lives, at a cost above income of between 4 and 5 Million pounds per annum, met largely by the Festival system.

Brethren, the RWProv Grand Master is very keen for this Festival to be a team effort bringing together the whole of the Province, over the next five years. We must unfailingly be sensitive to a Brother's personal financial circumstances, so we are targeting an average of £2 to £3 per week from a percentage of Members, i.e. the cost of a drink (and not a very large drink at that!) ...but let's not consider our contribution of a drink as a donation, ...having regard for the benefits provided by the RMBI - let us think of it as an investment, because we never know what is round the corner of Life... What better motivation can there be for supporting our Provincial Grand Master's ideal, to the benefit of one of our Great and most noteworthy Charities.

### Movember at the Lodge of Perfect Friendship





Dear Brethren,

ay I first thank you most sincerely for your most generous gift on my retirement as your Provincial Grand Master which ensured an outstanding holiday for Jinny and myself in New Zealand.

The four week sojourn in October was a tremendous success.

Starting with a few days in Singapore, where we sampled many of this Country's incredible attractions including, of course, their "Singapore Slings" - an amazing multi-flavoured fruit drink laced with alcohol of undisclosed origin! Our hotel, Raffles, could not have been better hosts and it was great to be spoilt so lavishly - Jinny's only complaint was that the bathroom scales were grossly inaccurate!

Our subsequent arrival in Auckland gave us the welcome opportunity of meeting many of my relatives after an absence of some thirty years. A great coming together, particularly with the younger ones who we had never met before. My 92 year "young" Uncle was a superb host throughout our Auckland visit and his remarkable memory brought alive so much of my early history. At one stage we drove up to the top of the North Island (Bay of Islands) and sailed out into the Southern Pacific to witness the "frolicking of wild dolphins" and the basking of seals - an incredible sight.

Our next port of call was Wellington - at the Southern end of the North Island and also my home city. Apart from catching up on the many physical changes in the capital, Jinny and I were entertained at Wellington Lodge (my Father's Mother Lodge and twinned with our Suffolk lodge - Caduceus 9536). Over 20 members and their wives

were present at the informal reception and their hospitality was so generous. A great evening and one we will remember for a long time to come Christchurch was our last port of call and my cousin and her husband initially swept us around a horrifying sight. Christchurch, you may recall, was devastated some three years ago by a series of severe earthquakes, which ripped up roads and highways in the city, destroying many of the industrial and domestic properties (including damage to my cousin's) as well as a national treasure, their Cathedral. Despite this appalling disaster, the indomitable spirit of the people of Christchurch was still very evident and I am sure, in several years time, they will create a new modern bustling city, more than a match for their old one.

On a brighter side, we travelled to Tekapo, a small village in the foothills of the Southern Alps - an incredible range of mountains, many still snow capped despite summer looming.

We were escorted up to Mount John University Observatory of international repute. Through telescopes we were able to see a long way out into the night sky and saw clearly Mars, Pluto and Venus. An amazing evening, providing an outstanding view of the planetary system.

Our return journey to Gatwick was fairly uneventful and, at times seemed never ending - took a mere 27 hours of flying, only descending to refuel!

As you will have gathered, Jinny and I had a truly amazing holiday, thanks again to your overwhelming generosity.

I thought I would now briefly dwell on my nine years experience as your Provincial Grand Master.

There is no doubt, in my mind, we epitomise all that is good in being small with just 2800 masons and 66 lodges. Our

Couple this with the subsequent £175, 000 for the building of a new Children's Hospice in Ipswich – a major County community project of enormous local importance.

We are also very positive in accepting challenges to improve still further the enjoyment and interest of our members. Some recent examples being, the introduction of mentoring, higher profiling of the activities of Lodge Officers and the encouragement of greater masonic understanding through our Orations process. Couple this with extensive upgrading of many of our Masonic Centres, particularly the larger ones, like Bury St. Edmunds and Lowestoft - we clearly have much to be proud of.

Another significant highlight for myself, was the Consecration in 2007 of a new lodge in the Province, Countryside No.9830. Six years on and we have a strong and robust addition to our strengths - what a bonus.

In conclusion, Brethren, being your Provincial Grand Master has been a great honour and privilege. I believe Suffolk can only go from strength to strength, under the new leadership of RWBro Ian Yeldham to whom I would commend your total support.

I now very much look forward to continuing the enjoyment of my masonry and the great friendships amongst so many of you.
