National Association of Masonic Clay Shooting Societies

Ten Masonic Provinces were represented at an historic meeting held at Freemasons Hall on 19th February 2015. They met to discuss, and agree, the formation of a National Association of Masonic Clay Shooting Societies. The meeting, hosted by the Metropolitan Grand Lodge of London and Chaired by Brian Saidman, discussed the Constitution and Bylaws for the formation of the new National Society and agreed some of the conditions for hosting the National Championships. A nominal fee was set for membership and the details to finalise the Bylaws was left in the hands of a small steering committee.

The committee was chaired by Brian Saidman (MetGL) with Mike Casey (West Lancashire) as Vice Chair. Roger Wilkes (East Kent) was Secretary and Cliff Jones (Hertfordshire) was Treasurer

The Provinces represented were: London Grand Metropolitan; West Lancashire; Essex; Wiltshire; Suffolk; East Kent; West Kent; Hertfordshire; Norfolk; Middlesex; Jersey (by proxy).

Since that date the number of Provinces has increased and at the Annual General Meeting in February this year 16 Provinces have joined the new Association and NAMCSS now has affiliation with 33 Provinces, 70% of the total number.

The Right Worshipful Deputy Grand Master, Jonathan Spence agreed to be President for the National Society we are indeed honoured to have him. Most Excellent Second Grand Principal Russell John Race, DL also agreed to be our Vice President we could not have better President & Vice President. When the four original members of the SMaCSS committee agreed to deliver the 15th National Masonic Clay Shooting Championships they probably had no idea then just how much work might be involved. When they found out they quickly recruited four experienced and well qualified people onto the committee to help and, now, the whole team is working hard to deliver a first class show and a 'First for Suffolk'.

Another first for us. We are, as usual, inviting raffle prize donations for, over the years and thanks to the generosity of our worthy supporters, these have been a major source of funding for us. But this year, we are having two raffles, the new addition being the Big Gun Raffle, with tickets priced at £5.00 each. The prize is an unused Webley & Scott 912K over and under Sporter in a case and we are very grateful to the donor.

Unknown Suffolk

Suffolk is an East Anglian county of historic origin. It has borders with Norfolk to the north, Cambridgeshire to the west and Essex to the south. The North Sea lies to the east. The county town is lpswich and other important towns include Lowestoft, Bury St Edmunds, Newmarket, Haverhill and Felixstowe, one of the largest container ports in Europe. The county is low-lying with very few hills and is largely arable land producing cereals with the wetlands of the Broads in the north. The Suffolk Coast & Heaths are an Area of Outstanding Natural Beauty.

The county was once rich from the proceeds of the wool trade. Many of its churches stand today as fine memorials to those days even though today one finds these enormous churches with no village that is large enough to use them adequately. The lost town of Dunwich, with its large and important port choked up by silt and sand for the first time in the days of Edward III, now lies beneath the sea. But there is history.

West Suffolk, like nearby East Cambridgeshire, is renowned for archaeological finds from the Stone Age, the Bronze Age and the Iron Age. Bronze Age artefacts have been found in the area between

Mildenhall and West Row, in Eriswell and Lakenheath. Many bronze objects, such as swords, spearheads, arrows, axes, palstaves, knives, daggers, rapiers, armour, decorative equipment (in particular for horses), and fragments of sheet bronze, are entrusted to the St. Edmundsbury heritage service, housed at West Stow just outside Bury St. Edmunds. Other finds include traces of cremations and barrows. In the east of the county is Sutton Hoo, the site of one of England's most significant Anglo-Saxon archaeological finds, a ship burial containing a collection of treasures including a Sword of State, gold and silver bowls, and jewellery and a lyre.

Much of Suffolk is low-lying and the coast is eroding rapidly. Coastal defences have been used to protect several towns, but several cliff-top houses have been lost to coastal erosion and others are under threat. The continuing protection of the coastline and the estuaries, including the Blyth, Alde and Deben has been, and remains, a matter of considerable discussion.

Ipswich has been a large port and was once one of the biggest shipbuilding places in England. Being the county town of agricultural Suffolk, industry around Ipswich has had a strong farming bias with Ransomes, Sims and Jefferies Ltd, one of the most famous agricultural manufacturers, located in the town. It is notable that the world's first commercial motorised lawnmower was built by Ransomes in 1902. Ransomes & Rapier was a major British manufacturer of railway equipment and later cranes and drag-lines, from 1869 to 1987. There was a sugar beet factory at Ipswich for many years; it was closed in 2001 as part of a rationalisation by British Sugar.

Willis Faber and Dumas Headquarters in Ipswich, was one of Norman Foster's earliest commissions. The British Telecom Research Laboratories were located to the east of the town in 1975 at Martlesham Heath; it is now a science park called Adastral Park. The area was originally RAF Martlesham Heath, a World War II airfield. Martlesham Heath was first used as a Royal Flying Corps airfield during World War I. In 1917 it became home to the Aeroplane Experimental Unit, RFC which moved from Upavon with the site named as the Aeroplane Experimental Station which became the Aeroplane & Armament Experimental Establishment (A&AEE) in 1924. The A&AEE carried the evaluation and testing of many of the aircraft types and much of the armament and other equipment that would later be used during World War II. Part of the old airfield is now the site of Suffolk Constabulary's police headquarters.

A key employment sector is insurance, both wholesale and retail sectors. Some of the major players with a key presence in Ipswich include Axa, Legal & General and Willis. Access to a skilled and experienced workforce has also led to the establishment of ancillary businesses serving these companies, including call centres dealing with sales and claims. Ipswich is one of the Haven Ports and is still a working port, handling several million tonnes of cargo annually. Bury St Edmunds developed less industrially and has grown into the fine market town we know today. Suffolk is noted for having been the home to two of England's best regarded painters Thomas Gainsborough and John Constable and one of its most noted composers Benjamin Britten.

The traditional nickname for people from Suffolk is 'Suffolk Fair-Maids', or 'Silly Suffolk', referring respectively to the supposed beauty of its female inhabitants in the Middle Ages and to the long history of Christianity in the county and its many fine churches (from Anglo-Saxon selige, originally meaning holy).





The Venue at High Lodge Leisure Centre & Shooting Ground

We have chosen High Lodge as our venue. Created over 30 years ago by 10 times FITASC Sporting World, European and British Champion, John Bidwell, High Lodge nestles amongst 120 acres of tranquil woodland on the Suffolk coast and is home to an array of first class facilities including luxury lodges with personal hot tubs, world class shooting, golf, fishing, an inviting restaurant and clubhouse and state of the art function suite to name a few. The ground has been used by SMaCSS as the venue for their annual Charity Clay Shoot for the last ten years. SMaCSS has developed an excellent working relationship with the team at High Lodge and they have been very supportive of us.

There is an extensive clubhouse which can seat around 250 people on circular tables and catering facilities to feed that number for a post shoot lunch/dinner. There is accommodation for up to 90 people on site in 19 holiday lodges comprising 2, 4 or 6 beds plus ample B&B or Hotel accommodation within 15 minutes' drive and a campsite for tents, caravans and motor homes within 5 minutes' drive.

The message we wish to send to our supporters who intend to enter, and to our visitors and spectators, is that "you will find the site at High Lodge (IP17 3QT) to be situated in a very pleasant part of Suffolk. The shooting will be challenging but fair and we look forward to seeing you there for the 2019 National Championships on June 22nd."

High Lodge is situated just off the main A12 located between Southwold and Aldeburgh, within a short distance from both Lowestoft and Ipswich on the Suffolk heritage coast. Just one mile north of Darsham main line railway station, High Lodge is quick and easy to access. Rail service to London Liverpool Street is available at Darsham station. High Lodge also has helicopter landing facilities for visitors who prefer to travel by air.

Where to stay - Accommodation at High Lodge is available but, to be sure of satisfaction and to secure the accommodation of your choice, it is strongly recommended that you start now to make your enquiries.



The Charity



The Suffolk Horse - Since 2008, when we started by supporting EACH who were looking to build a new hospice, we have been able to distribute more than £20,000 to our various Charities and this year we have decided to support both the 2019 Suffolk Provincial Festival and the Suffolk Horse. Perhaps better known to most as the Suffolk Punch, the Suffolk Horse breed (Equus ferus caballus) is under serious threat and in danger of dying out. We are determined to do something about that serious situation in the months and years to come.

We have less than 10 years to save the iconic Suffolk Punch horse - as experts predict the critically endangered breed could become extinct by 2027. With only 80 viable breeding females left in the UK, the Rare Breed Survival Trust (RBST) has placed the Suffolk horse as number three on its list of farm breeds

most likely to die out. Desperate measures are being taken to preserve the animal's future, including collecting genetic samples from stallions across the globe to ensure enough variance survives to kick-start the breed if traditional methods fail. The first Suffolk Horse Stud Book, published in 1880, showed there were more than 1,400 stallions and 1,124 mares registered in the UK, the majority in East Anglia.

A local farmer, who owns eight of the horses himself, said "people in Suffolk often do not realise quite how endangered the animal is as it plays such an important role as a Suffolk icon. It is a category one critically endangered animal - they are in a muddle, there's no doubt about it. But a lot of people in Suffolk don't realise how rare it is - you always see them at the Suffolk Show and at displays. My generation have done all they can but we owe it to future generations to keep our heritage alive - whether it's Framlingham Castle or the Suffolk Horse."

Tom Beeston, CEO of the RBST, said it is important to build the population in other places other than Suffolk. He said: "There only 80 that are able to breed or likely to be bred from. We are now collecting specimens for a gene bank, we are desperate to get as many stallions samples as we can. Then we can create them in the future like they do in Jurassic Park. With cattle we collect embryos so we can get those frozen but it can cost up to £10,000 per horse to collect.

"These numbers do not bode well for the breed - this is our heritage," he added. "Once they are lost they are gone forever and our grandchildren's children may never see them. Breeding technology has grown leaps and bounds over the last few years with genetic groups and embryos. Hopefully it won't be long before we can develop further to breed more stallions and mares all over the country." Once plentiful across much of England, the health of the Suffolk Punch population was badly dented during World War One, when thousands died attempting to haul heavy artillery towards the trenches. While their numbers steadily recovered during the 1920s, the introduction of tractors saw another steep decline from the 1960s onwards, with the breed now considered to be the rarest horse in Britain.

Terms & Conditions - Rules of entry

- 1. Masonic entries must be subscribing members of a Craft Lodge or Royal Arch Chapter
- 2. Guest Entries must accompany a Masonic Entry
- 3. Ladies must be related to Members of a Craft Lodge or Royal Arch Chapter
- 4. Juniors must be under 18 years of age on the date of the Championships and related to Members of a Craft Lodge or Royal Arch Chapter
- 5. Veterans must be over 65 on the day of the Championships and must be subscribing members of a Craft Lodge or Royal Arch Chapter
- 6. All entries should be covered by 3rd Party Liability Insurance
- 7. The Championships will be shot under the CPSA rules for English Sporting
- 8. The Championships will consist of 100 targets
- 9. Only English Shot sizes 7 to 9 may be used
- 10. No larger than 28 gram (1 oz.) cartridges may be used
- 11. No home or reloaded cartridges to be used
- 12. Release triggers are forbidden
- 13. Guns should be carried in a slip or case
- 14. Head, Hearing & Eye protection must be used
- 15. Local or Ground rules will also apply





The Programme and Schedule

Timetable – please arrive in good time. Park in the car park where a Marshall will direct you to the Function Room entrance which you must use. Unless carried in a sleeve, guns must be broken and empty at all times until standing in the shooting position. Keep to the walkways and obey all safety signs. We recommend the wearing of solid footwear and rugged clothing. The surfaces and walkways are uneven so please watch your footing.
